In the past few articles, I've been writing on "Four Important Practices of an Outward

The enclosing and insulating process is not finished but continues to move along. Connecting to the sewer has also progressed and is complete. As you may remember connecting to the sewer was more difficult than originally planned. The sewer main was more than 20 ft below ground. If you

The first visible sign of activity was the dirt work. Dirt was hauled in, the retention areas were dug, and the pad for our new church building started to take shape. Next came the foundation. Channels were cut, rebar

was laid, and concrete was poured. Then came the floor. A large cement pad sitting on a mound of dirt to some may be under whelming, but for us it marked progress. This



meant our foundation was complete, and we were ready for the building itself to start going up. Once the steel arrived the structure happened to drive past the building site, you would have seen a large hole in the northeast corner where crews worked to access and connect to the sewer. The connection has now been made and the hole has been filled in. Along with the sewer being connected the building has water and electricity brought in. Some windows have also been

> installed and brick work on the front has begun. All in all, the building continues to move forward. The original goal of having the shell complete by Thanksgiving looks to be obtainable.

As we continue moving forward, we ask for prayers and encouragement for the building committee. We are all excited to reach our next milestone of having the church

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enclosed and the shell complete, but this is only a milestone as there will be much more work to do. Once the building is enclosed the work of finishing off the inside spaces begin.

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
